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WARM RELATIONSHIPS: BIRTHDAY CARDS TO EVERY MEMBER AND REGULAR GUESTS

Why do we send birthday cards? In the fall of 2022, Janice Gockel, Allene Steinberg, and myself attended the ELCA sponsored course on the research done by Fuller Youth Institute called Grow Young. Fuller studied thriving Christian churches and dying churches and wrote a book on what they believe allows a church to grow. They found that for churches to grow they need to be Jesus centered and put their energy in these 6 domains: prioritize everywhere to youth, best neighbors, keychain leadership, empathy today, Jesus message, and warm relationships. Fuller challenges us to put our energies in these domains whether you are the Pastor of the congregation, a council member, or just anyone in the congregation. At the time, we felt we were pretty good about service to others, but felt we needed to take care of members better.

So, to support WARM RELATIONSHIPS, in January 2023 we began sending birthday cards to members, each staff person, and frequent guests that were willing to give me their birthday information. The cards are signed by fellow members and I address, stamp, and mail them out weekly with the hopes that they will get to the birthday person slightly before their birthday. In 2023, we sent out 144 birthday cards. We also sent out about a dozen valentine cards and Christmas cards to our members who were attending services mostly on-line at that Holiday time. So, we spent about \$ 100.00 on stamps for this ministry of support/celebration because all of the birthday cards were donated!

Thank you so much to all of you who take the time to sign a birthday card - a card that was only signed by me on our behalf would be boring! Thank you also for all the donated birthday cards that have kept our cost low! Thank you to all of you that help me set up and clean up the table and chairs for signing cards!

I use the online church directory for birthday and address information; so, if you move or change your birthday, be sure and let Mari know so she can update the file! If you are not in the directory and would like a birthday card, catch me at coffee hour and I will get your information in my little black book. If you didn't get a birthday card last year and should have, let me know so I can solve the problem.

BUILDING UPDATES

Elevator Modernization. Now that the elevator has been restored to full service, circulation through the building has returned to normal. We're still waiting for the elevator contractor to update us on their schedule for upgrading the lighting and finishes within the elevator cab, but that work should be completed shortly.

Work Party for New Sunday School Classroom. We had a very productive work party on Saturday March 2nd, and all of the Sunday School furnishings and equipment have now been relocated to Room 205 at the south end of the upper floor. Several other pending tasks were completed by the 11 ULC members that pitched in for the work party, and they have our gratitude.

Renovation of Tenant Spaces. We're continuing to complete the renovation of tenant spaces on the upper floor, including rooms 200, 201, 202, 203, and our new multi-use Sunday School space in Classroom 205. Windows and carpets have been professionally cleaned, and painters will be repainting the walls throughout these rooms in the last half of March. Additionally, light fixtures in the tenant spaces are being renovated with new LED lighting and new lenses to replace the old, yellowed lenses. Carpet and windows were also cleaned in the upper floor hallway.

Thanks Colin! ULC custodian Colin Ernst has turned out to be a very handy guy to have around. Colin has been handling several repair and maintenance chores around the building, including repairing wallboard damage in preparation for the upper floor painting project.

Important Security Reminder. Many of you know that we've had several instances when folks have exited through locked exit doors without confirming that the doors have latched behind them. We continue to wrestle with this problem, and may need to upgrade some door closers or take other measures to ensure that our building remains secure. Please make certain, when you exit the building, that the door has fully closed and latched before you walk away. This is particularly true at the north entrance at the parking lot, and at the south entrance from the Narthex to NE 50th Street. Let's keep our building secure and safe for all members, guests, staff, tenants and their clients.

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FROM OUR BISHOP

In fifth grade, I started playing trumpet. This wasn't the instrument that I chose – it was chosen for me because my aunt had an old trumpet and my mom said, "If you want to be in band, you can use this trumpet." But even though I wanted to play the flute, the trumpet was definitely the instrument for me. I loved playing trumpet. I loved the sound, the way to make different notes with just three valves, using different mutes that produced complexity of tone. I loved to polish and clean my trumpet – especially when I received a new silver trumpet in high school. The only thing I didn't like was carrying it to and from school because of the big hill that we lived on.

In high school I was in both band and jazz band. In jazz band we traveled to many competitions – winning the Reno Jazz Festival one year. When I look back on my experience in band, I realize that there are so many things that I continue to apply in my life, and as part of the body of Christ, that go back to being in band.

First, you can't be a band on your own. If you play a solo instrument, that is lovely. But that isn't a band. There needs to be a group to form a band – it can be small or large – but an agreement that you are engaging with one another and playing music with one another leads to forming a band. If you are using music, the same music is important – also the same key and the same beats per measure helps. An agreement on how fast or slow the tempo is important. In short, community is needed for a band.

Second, you can't all play the same instrument. I mean, I love the trumpet – but a band of trumpets is one-dimensional (and can be very loud). I admit that as much as I love brass, you need more than brass to form a band. We have all heard brass quartets – but for a band, you need the saxophone, the piccolo, the clarinet, the drum, and so much more. Diversity is needed in a band.

Third, you can't drown out others. I speak as one who plays trumpet. Trumpets know how to be loud. And if trumpeters are not careful, they

will hide the beauty of the other instruments. There is nothing more gorgeous than notes from an oboe coming from seemingly nowhere to fill the air with that wistful, haunting sound. In other words, listen for the woodwinds. A variety of sounds and voices are needed in a band – especially those that are more hidden.

Fourth, harmony doesn't mean the same note. It would be boring if every single instrument played the very same note for every song in a band's repertoire. Our ears are tuned to hear melody, harmony, dissonance, and resolution. In a band, it is imperative that different notes are played – different rhythm patterns are introduced, and a play amongst the instruments happens. Harmony and dissonance are needed in a band.

Dear people of God, these four things are also needed in the church and in the world: Community, diversity, variety of sound and voice, harmony and dissonance. I invite you to think about your worshiping community. How are we all like a band? How can we be more intentional in these four areas?

Our composer and maestro is God – God is directing and leading us – in the music we cocreate. May this spring awaken you in the beauty and grace of God. May the community in which you gather bring music in all its fullness.
